It's a geopolitical condition













Consciousness is what makes the mind-body problem really intractable.









Abb. 3. Schema des Funktionskreises.



Evolution without Inheritance: Steps to an Ecology of Learning


Attempts to integrate human culture, history, or symbolic imagination into a comprehensive theory of evolution have, up to now, foundered on a bifurcation between mind and nature deeply embedded in the project of modern science.

To resolve the impasse ... I propose ... a revitalized theory of learning that promises to unify the fields of evolution and ecology.



Life continues to evolve, not because of what each individual contributes to the pool of inherited variation but because each, in it's way, helps to carry on the relational matrix within which all are inextricably enmeshed.

In and through their activities, living beings of all sorts, human and nonhuman, continuously shape the conditions of development for themselves, one another, and their successors.



Generative Field = Relational matrix

Peirce's Panpsychism

The entire universe ... is perfused with signs, if it is not composed exclusively of signs.

... thought is not necessarily connected with a brain. It appears in the work of bees, of crystals, and throughout the purely physical world... Tychism: God does play dice

Synechism: There is no separate existence

Whitehead's Panpsychism

The ultimate constituents of reality are subjects, not objects

There is no separate existence

Reality is creative


What I am essentially protesting against is the bifurcation of nature into two systems of reality ... namely into the nature apprehended in awareness and the nature which is the cause of awareness.

David Bohm


... everyone has got some kind of metaphysics, even if he thinks he hasn't ...


